NUYTSIANA

[Supplementary material to John Fletcher's "Peter Nuyts and his *Album Amicorum*" published as part of the society's first occasional paper.]

The following details of the domestic and marital career of Pieter Nuyts, both in the Netherlands and the Dutch East Indies, derive from an essay written in 1966 by Miss J.S.M. Heman as a student of the University of Nijmegen.

A copy of Miss Heman's typescript is held by the *Stadsarchief* in Breda. For this information, and for the thoughtful provision of a xerox copy of the relevant pages (pp.2-6, and 24-25), I am indebted to Dr. C. Lohmann, archivist of the municipality of Etten-Leur.

- 1620 6 April: death in Middelburg of Elisabeth Nuyts (née Walrams), mother of Pieter Nuyts.
- 1620 13 April: death in Middelburg of Laurens Nuyts. Both parents are buried "in de nieuwe kerk in haar eijge graft".
- 1620 26 April: marriage of Pieter Nuyts to Cornelia Jacot, daughter of Hans Jacot (died 4 February 1624) and Anna Jacot (née Verhalft, died 18 February 1623) of Middelburg.
- 1626 22 May: Pieter Nuyts leaves for the East Indies "met mijn oudste Broertje" Laurens.

- 1626 21 September: birth in Middelburg "in haar huijs genaamt de Steen Hoosstraat over't oostindies huijs" of twin daughters Anna Cornelia and Elisabeth, to Cornelia and Pieter Nuyts.
- 1631 25 March: Cornelia Nuyts and her surviving children, Pieter and Anna Cornelia, sail for the Dutch East Indies on board the *Prins Hendrik*.
- 1631 November: death of Cornelia Nuyts in Batavia. Her children are cared for and educated by a niece, Maria.
- 1639: Anna Cornelia Nuyts returns to the Netherlands on the *Princess Amalia* in a voyage that lasts "een Jaar min drie daegen".
- 1640 1 January: Pieter Nuyts is married to Maria van Driel at 's-Gravenhage.
- 1640: birth in Middelburg of Pieter Nuyts II and death of Maria Nuyts. She is interred in Nuyts' parents' tomb.
- 1645, 1647 and 1648: Pieter Nuyts elected mayor of Hulst.
- 1649 26 April: on the 29th anniversary of his first marriage, Pieter Nuyts marries Agnes Granier, daughter of Abraham Granier and Catharina Granier (née Simons). The ceremony takes place in the Walloon Church at Middelburg.
- 1651 18 April: Anna Cornelia Nuyts marries in Hulst Sebastiaan Bernagie, "weesmeester" and brewer of Breda.
- 1651 19 August: Pieter Nuyts becomes alderman, an office he retains until his death.
- 1655 11 December: death in Hulst of Pieter Nuyts.
- 1665: death in Hulst of Agnes Nuyts.
- 1698: Anna Cornelia Bernagie (née Nuyts) compiles a genealogical account of the Nuyts and Bernagie families. This chronicle, now preserved in the Public Records Office of 's-Hertogenbosch, is

the source of the quotations used above.

1709: death in Leyden of Anna Cornelia Bernagie.

THE WORKS OF MR. THOMAS SOUTHERNE (1721)

Newspaper advertisements for the second edition of Thomas Southerne's dramatic works printed for J. Tonson, B. Tooke, M. Wellington, and W. Chetwood, 1721, raise some interesting queries about the precise circumstances of issue. Like its predecessor printed for Tonson, Tooke and Lintott in 1713, the edition is a duodecimo in two volumes. It differs in omitting the author's preface, and in adding an extra play, *The Spartan Dame*, which first appeared in print in 1719. 'The Works of Mr. *Thomas Southerne*, 2 Vol. To which is added, the Tragedy of the Spartan Dame' is advertised by W. Mears in the *Daily Journal* for 1 March 1721/2 as 'This Day . . . publish'd . . . printed on an Elzevir Letter, in neat Pocket Volumes', and by G. Strahan in the *Daily Post* for 27 April 1722 as 'Just publish'd'. The same setting of type was also used to produce a separate 'fifth' [actually second] edition of *The Spartan Dame* under Chetwood's imprint 'With the Addition of the 400 Lines omitted in the Representation, and the former Editions'. This is advertised as the third item in a list of Chetwood publications on E8^v of the first edition - published, according to the *Daily Journal*, on 29 April 1721 - of Edward Young's *The Revenge*, and again as 'The Spartan Dame, a Tragedy, by the Eminent Mr. Southern' in the same newspaper for 6 October 1721, the advertiser this time being S. Chapman, co-publisher of *The Revenge* and a frequent associate of Chetwood in publishing ventures. The separate issue of the enlarged version of *The Spartan Dame* was thus available nearly a year before the appearance of the Mears advertisement for the collected edition. Two minor type corrections on A7^v - Seduc'd] Snduc'd (1.4) and other wise] otherwise (1.40) - indicate that the sheets for the separate issue were produced *after* those for the collected edition. (Page numbers and signatures have also, naturally, been reset.)
